Dear CANNT Members,

I hope you are all enjoying the beautiful summer so far and taking advantage of the wonderful weather to relax and spend time with family and loved ones!

Long considered the gold standard treatment option for patients with end-staged renal disease, everyone who works with renal patients can have a role to play in promoting transplantation with living kidney donation as an option. Although many of us who work with renal patients may work in areas such as CKD clinics, peritoneal or hemodialysis and not necessarily directly in transplantation there are still many things that can be done to promote living kidney donation to both our patients and their support circles. Even if the nearest transplant centre is geographically distant or separated by other barriers here are some ideas to promote living donation awareness and to help make it more accessible to our patients:

- Ensure patients visit their GPs regularly. Sometimes patients who come for dialysis three times a week seek to have their primary care needs met at their dialysis unit. Although this may be convenient for some, it cannot replace primary care nor the important screening and prevention required to be approved as a recipient. For example, pap tests, cardiac testing and immunizations all need to be maintained and up to date.
- Promote screening for depression for patients who are high risk. Some studies indicate that up to 90% of patients dependent on dialysis suffer from depression. Referring patients to receive treatment can improve their adherence to the testing regimen and processes required to be considered for a transplant. Transplant centres are becoming increasingly creative with multiple trans-national

May 5 - 8, 2018 17th Congress of the chains for living donation, with these initiatives which can require travel to another province for donors and/or patients, anxiety and stress levels can run even higher.

- Arrange an educational in-service even if it has to be by distance or webinar with your local transplant centre. Make sure everyone on your team knows who the up to date contacts are for any questions from staff, patients or potential donors.
- Ensure your waiting room is well stocked with information on living donation for families and patients. Placing a large green transplant ribbon somewhere where it will attract attention can be helpful in sparking conversations. Many patients feel unsure on how to approach the topic of being a living donor with their loved ones. One strategy is to approach a loved one about being their advocate, making sure the advocate has all the up to date information about becoming a living donor from the testing required to what life is like afterwards. The advocate can be the patient's spokesperson and approach potential donors in the patient's circle so the patient does not have to feel embarrassed by asking directly.
