

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World Kidney Day is a global awareness campaign aimed at raising awareness of the importance of our kidneys. This year's theme is **Kidneys & Women's Health: Include, Value, Empower**. Chronic kidney disease (CKD) is a worldwide public health problem with adverse outcomes of kidney failure and premature death. CKD affects approximately 195 million women worldwide and it is currently the 8th leading cause of death in women, with close to 600,000 deaths each year.

In 2018, World Kidney Day and International Women's Day will be marked on the same day, offering the opportunity to highlight the importance of women's health and particularly their kidney health. On what will be its 13th anniversary, the campaign will promote affordable and equitable access to health education, care and prevention for all women and girls globally.

Kidneys & Women's Health

- Chronic Kidney Disease affects approximately 195 million **#women** worldwide. **#WorldKidneyDay**
- Chronic Kidney Disease is more likely to develop in **#women** compared to men, with an average 14% prevalence in women and 12% in men. **#BeAware #WorldKidneyDay**
- Chronic Kidney Disease is the 8th leading cause of death in **#women** causing more than 600,000 female deaths a year **#WorldKidneyDay**
- Some kidney diseases, such as **#lupus nephropathy** or kidney infection (acute or chronic pyelonephritis) typically affect **#women**. **#WorldKidneyDay**
- The prevalence of Chronic Kidney Disease is rising and may affect 3% of **#women** in their childbearing years - **#prevention #WorldKidneyDay**
- **#Women** who have Chronic Kidney Disease are at increased risk of negative health outcomes for the mother and the baby. **#BeAware**
- **#Pregnancy-related complications** increase the risk of kidney disease - **#women** who have **#preeclampsia** are 4-to-5 times more likely to develop kidney failure **#BeAware #WorldKidneyDay**
- Intensive dialysis can increase chances of successful pregnancy in **#women** with CKD **#WorldKidneyDay**
- In **#women** who have received successful kidney transplants, fertility can be restored and pregnancy associated complications are much improved. **#WorldKidneyDay**

- While #Women tend more often to #donate organs, they are less likely to receive them. Kidneys are no exception. **#WorldKidneyDay**
- Education of #women protects both their health and their children's health. **#WorldKidneyDay**



L'insuffisance rénale chronique (IRC) touche les femmes dans le monde entier

Le risque de développer une insuffisance rénale chronique est au moins aussi élevé chez la femme que chez l'homme, si pas plus élevé. Selon certaines études, il est plus probable que l'insuffisance rénale chronique se développe chez la femme que chez l'homme, avec une prévalence de 14% en moyenne chez la femme et 12% chez l'homme. Cependant il y a moins de femmes dialysées que d'hommes. Il y a au moins 3 raisons qui expliquent cela: la progression de l'insuffisance rénale chronique est plus lente chez la femme que chez l'homme, l'existence de barrières psychologiques et socio-économiques telles qu'une conscience plus faible de la maladie entraînant un commencement tardif ou l'absence de le non recours à la dialyse chez la femme et l'accès inégal aux soins qui est un problème majeur dans les pays qui n'ont pas l'accès universel aux soins de santé. La greffe de rein est également répartie de façon inégale, principalement à cause de facteurs sociaux, culturels et psychologiques: même dans certains pays qui offrent la greffe de rein et un traitement équitable pour les hommes et les femmes, les femmes ont plus souvent tendance à faire un don de rein et ont moins de chance d'en recevoir. Il y a donc un besoin évident d'aborder la question de l'accès équitable aux soins de santé pour les femmes dans le monde entier et de sensibiliser et d'éduquer pour leur favoriser l'accès aux traitements et à leur obtenir de meilleurs résultats en matière de santé.

Certaines maladies rénales, telles que la néphropathie lupique ou l'infection rénale (pyélonéphrite aiguë ou chronique) touchent généralement les femmes. La néphropathie lupique est une maladie rénale causée par une maladie auto-immune qui a pour caractéristique que le système immunitaire du corps attaque ses propres cellules et organes. La pyélonéphrite est une infection potentiellement grave qui concerne un seul ou les deux reins. Les infections rénales (à l'instar de la plupart des infections urinaires) sont plus fréquentes chez les femmes et les risques augmentent pendant la grossesse. Afin d'obtenir de bons résultats (comme pour la plupart des maladies rénales), le diagnostic et le traitement doivent être précoces.

DID YOU KNOW?

Internationally, purple is a colour for symbolising women. Historically the combination of purple, green and white to symbolise women's equality originated from the Women's Social and Political Union in the UK in 1908. Purple signifies justice and dignity. Green symbolises hope. White represents purity, but is no longer used due to 'purity' being a controversial concept. The introduction of the colour yellow representing a 'new dawn' is commonly used to signify a second wave of feminism. Thus purple with green represents traditional feminism, purple with yellow represents progressive contemporary feminism.
